### School Facility Conditions and Planned Improvements (School Year 2023 - 2024)

The campus was built in 2002 and has 47 classrooms, eight classroom pods, a multipurpose room with a stage, band room, kitchen classroom, TV production classroom, specialized science wing, two computer labs, and a gym that contains a dance room. The school has extensive fields for physical education including a running track, basketball courts, and a football field. TJMS is on the same property as Franklin High School, separated by fences and the Franklin Community Library, which is the largest in the city serving both schools as well as the local community.

The LEA takes great efforts to ensure that all schools are clean, safe, and functional. To assist in this effort, the LEA uses a facility survey instrument developed by the State of California Office of Public School Construction. The results of this survey are available at the district office. Included is information from the facility survey instrument on the condition of the school and the efforts made to ensure that students are provided with a clean, safe, and functional learning environment. Our school received an "Exemplary" status based on the State's definitions for each of the eight categories evaluated, which is the highest rating possible.

The district's maintenance and grounds departments work with the school site custodial team to ensure that school buildings, classrooms, and grounds are maintained. The district utilizes an electronic work order system enabling site administration and custodians to communicate maintenance needs, urgent repairs, or necessary projects. Emergency repair needs are immediately resolved by either the school custodian or district maintenance staff. The school's custodians work as a team and with the principal to develop a daily cleaning process and schedule. Each morning, prior to the arrival of staff and students, the custodian inspects the school and the site is cleaned each evening. Restrooms are inspected throughout the day to ensure that they are adequately stocked, safe, and sanitary.

The State Deferred Maintenance Program (DMP) was established in 1980 to aid districts in major maintenance projects. Beginning with the 2013-2014 fiscal year and the inception of the Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) the State has intended for Deferred Maintenance needs and expenses to be included in the District's LCFF allotment. The district continues to fund routine projects previously considered as part of the State's former DMP at levels required by the State and continues to use local resources.

During 2023, facilities improvements included adding; a 16 foot retractable screen in the gym along with a long range laser projector to enable large group presentations, a cement pathway to the entry of the bike rack, ceiling mounted projectors and speakers along with interactive white boards in all classrooms, large monitors in both front offices for watching TJTV, displaying welcoming messages, and advertising school information, and wifi to the dance room, MP room, gym, and Student Store.

Through extended day instruction, targeted interventions are provided and available after school. Our CTE (Career Technical Education) courses prepare students for a variety of high school pathways. Our award-winning marching band competes in high school competitions, and our programs have been aligned with Franklin High School.

### **Professional Development**

Our school and district offer a variety of professional learning opportunities for teachers, instructional aides, and non-instructional support staff. Teachers take part in professional development programs to increase students' conceptual understanding of mathematics, science, reading, and writing. Our teachers are dedicated to providing the enhanced strategies available through state adopted standards. Special Education teachers and EL teachers have additional opportunities to learn how to best support students with special learning needs. Our school has a weekly late start schedule so departments and teams can meet and coordinate curriculum and instruction. Teachers meet to review student work, make determinations about students' strengths and weaknesses, and plan subsequent instruction to meet students' needs. Paraeducators, school secretaries, office clerks, security, and custodians take classes that relate to their work such as learning new computer skills, and learning to work more efficiently and in ergonomically correct ways. All teachers have the opportunity for two PLC release days for aligning curriculum and all staff take EGUSD courses in Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion.
