School Facility Conditions and Planned Improvements (School Year 2023 - 2024)

James Rutter Middle School is 57 years young in April 2023. This school has 46 classrooms, including a brand new Science Center, a multipurpose room, a library, a gymnasium, boys and girls locker rooms, and an administration building. On the western portion of the property we have approximately three acres of ball fields, basketball courts, and a decomposed granite track. The main campus was built in 1966. Additions were constructed in 1990, 2001 and 2020. Our original Science building was modified due to fire and was available for students in January 2018. The school district completed a new science wing which opened in Fall of 2020. Through Measure M funds, our parking lot and front of the school underwent a major modernization during the summer of 2023.

The LEA takes great efforts to ensure that all schools are clean, safe, and functional. To assist in this effort, the LEA uses a facility survey instrument developed by the State of California Office of Public School Construction. The results of this survey are available at the district office. Included is information from the facility survey instrument on the condition of the school and the efforts made to ensure that students are provided with a clean, safe, and functional learning environment. Our school received an "Exemplary" status based on the State's definitions for each of the eight categories evaluated, which is the highest rating possible.

School Facility Good Repair Status

The district's maintenance and grounds departments work with the school site custodial team to ensure that school buildings, classrooms, and grounds are maintained at exceptional levels to provide a safe and functional environment for all students. The district utilizes the latest electronic work order system enabling site administration and custodians to communicate maintenance needs, urgent repairs, or necessary projects. Emergency repair needs are immediately resolved by either the school custodian or district maintenance staff. The school's custodians work as a team and with the principal to develop a daily cleaning process and schedule. The bathrooms and rooms are inspected throughout the day to ensure all supplies are well stocked for all students and staff.

The State Deferred Maintenance Program (DMP) was established in 1980 to aid districts in major maintenance projects. Beginning with the 2013-2014 fiscal year and the inception of the Local Control Funding Formula (LCFF) the State has intended for Deferred Maintenance needs and expenses to be included in the District's LCFF allotment. The district continues to fund routine projects previously considered as part of the State's former DMP at levels required by the State and continues to use local resources.

This year, the district's governing board has approved deferred maintenance projects for this school such as painting of all exterior hallways and repairing of plumbing and drainage systems. We are happy to have a Science Lab-Ready building so that our seven science teachers can implement Next Generation Science Standards to fidelity as well as a brand new, fully equipped Future Quest lab room. The lights and technology in the gym and MP room were updated and the district has installed a security camera system. James Rutter has seen many projects completed during 2023. The parking lot and front of the school have been updated, all exterior lighting has been replaced, the entire school has been rewired to increase data capacity and our wireless internet has been upgraded.

At James Rutter Middle School we have highly qualified staff to assist students with special learning needs. Our Strategies Department supports students who need additional support to meet the standards. The Acaletes (ASES) after school program provides opportunities for students who need extra tutoring or homework help in conjunction with student-interest based enrichment curriculum. We offer a four week Summer School Program in June. The focus of the middle school summer school programs center around enrichment. Students are exposed to a multitude of activities which may include, arts and crafts, athletics, music and team building activities. We offer a 3-day event in August called Jumpstart for our incoming 7th graders. The students get to know some of our teachers, learn about scheduling, receive character education and finish each day with a free lunch.
