Teacher Credentials and Misassignments

In the 2022-2023 school year, over 99 percent of the district's teachers held full teaching credentials. In addition to being fully credentialed, if a class is 20 percent or more English Learners (EL), the teacher should hold a supplementary authorization to instruct students in learning English or they are considered misassigned. In subjects with a shortage, a fully credentialed teacher is sometimes asked to teach outside of their subject matter competency area until an appropriately credentialed teacher can be hired. In these cases, teachers are counted as misassigned. Vacancies are defined as a position to which a permanent teacher has not been assigned by the beginning of the course. Most vacancies in our district are in subject areas where qualified teachers are in shortage.

School Facility Conditions and Planned Improvement

Florence Markofer has 32 classrooms, a multipurpose room, a library, and an office building. The main campus was built in 1989. Two new permanent wings were completed in 2010 to replace the old portable classrooms. The newest buildings have teacher workspaces and staff meeting areas as part of the design.

The district's maintenance and grounds departments collaborate with the site custodial team to ensure that school buildings and grounds are maintained at high levels to provide a safe and functional environment for all students. The district uses the latest electronic work order system enabling site administration and custodians to communicate maintenance needs, urgent repairs, or necessary projects. Emergency repair needs are resolved by either the school custodian or district maintenance staff. The site custodians work as a team with administration to develop a daily cleaning process and schedule. Each morning the custodian inspects the school prior to students and staff entering school grounds. Restrooms are inspected throughout the day.

In 2020-2021 a new roof was installed on the Library Building and Kindergarten building. Through Measure M funding a Refresh in Summer of 2022 was completed on the site with new carpet, installation of a shade structure on the playground, new campus signage, painting and lighting updates in classrooms. In 2022-2023 the computer lab was updated with a new electrical panel and dedicated data to support up to 72 devices. In addition, the student broadcast student was upgraded in the 2022-2023 school year through a grant from the Sacramento Educational Cable Consortium enabling student news crews to report and share activities and important information to students, staff, and school community using industry standard media equipment.

For the 2023 - 2024 school year, class sizes are 24 to 1 in Transitional Kindergarten through 3rd grade, and 28 to 1 in 4th through 6th grades.

Professional Development

Our school and district offer a variety of professional learning opportunities for teachers, instructional aides, and non-instructional support staff. The 2023-2024 focus of our professional learning for all of our employees is to provide professional development opportunities that promote educator equity, quality, and effectiveness.

Professional Learning Communities are in place at every grade level focusing on enhancing the instructional program and ongoing improvement of academic achievement.

New teachers, who have been teaching fewer than two years, are supported by the district's beginning teacher Induction program. They meet weekly with an experienced mentor to discuss their successes, challenges and new strategies.

Finally, the district offers a variety of classes for teachers, and support staff. Instructional aides, school secretaries, office clerks, and custodians may take classes relating to their work.

School Safety Plan

At Florence Markofer, we believe that our students and staff should feel safe at all times. In addition, our staff reviewed and updated our Comprehensive Safe School Plan in February 2023, September 2023 and January 2024. Included in the plan are monitoring practices that not only address student safety during school hours, but before and after school as well. All visitors sign in at the school office before entering the campus. An "Emergency Handbook", outlining a plan of action for emergencies, is kept in the school office and in each classroom. Emergency drills are conducted monthly. Random, periodic school safety inspections are conducted by the County of Sacramento. The district's Police Services Department works closely with our school site to provide a safe and secure environment for all students and staff.

Specialized Programs

At Florence Markofer, we have highly qualified staff to assist students with special learning needs. Each teacher is the primary intervention specialist in their class. Our Academic Intervention Teachers provide supplemental instruction for students needing additional support in foundational reading and math skills. Our highly qualified teaching staff provides our English Learners with instruction to access the core curriculum as well as English Language Development lessons. Gifted and Talented Education (GATE) students and accelerated students participate in after school extended day programs. We have teachers who provide tutoring to students after school. We support four classes of students with autism in grades TK-6 who need more support acquiring language and social skills.
